#### In Memoriam



**Spaet Henriksen**, 84, a longstanding member of the International Society for Teacher Education, died on December 22, 2010.

Spaet Henriksen was born in Greenland by Danish parents. Her christen name was Elisabeth Gam. In 1938, shortly before the Second World War, she was sent alone to

Denmark for education. In 1945, she was reunited with her parents, her brother, and sister in Nuuk. Back again in Copenhagen, she graduated from a teacher college. A few years later she became a specialist teacher in literature. Being a mother of four children she finished her M.A. in Education and immediately afterwards she became professor of education at The Royal Danish School of Education (now School of Education Aarhus University) until 1996. Until 2001 she had been the president for more than 15 years of the Danish association Paedagogisk Forum.

One of her academic fields was progressive education. Spaet had understood the essence of the child-centered progressive education. Through her writings as well as her work as a teacher she displayed a genuine progressive education with a deep respect and understanding of the child.

She raised a talented and gifted set of children—Peter (project manager), Soeren (stage manager), Karen (interior designer), and Jesper (teacher)—and so was able to personalize her special gift for nurturing and developing children and youth. Anyone she entertained knew of her special culinary skills and left her dinners recognizing her wizardry in cooking. She was preceded in death by her husband Sven Henriksen (former principal of a teacher college).

We who were so fortunate to know and work together with Spaet will miss her generosity, warmth and academic intensity. One of the great personalities of Danish progressive education has passed. Condolences for the family can be forwarded to the address: edunet@telia.com
